Foundation faces a tough year

We reach less than 20% of Peace Corps Volunteers who served in the Philippines

The PCAFPD is facing a financial challenge in 2010. As shown in the chart on Page 2, during 2009, for the first time, our expenses slightly exceeded our income and we had to dip into reserve funds. During the last academic year PCAFPD supported 47 scholars. We are committed to supporting 50 scholars in the upcoming academic year, a serendipitous coincidence with the upcoming 50th anniversary of Peace Corps.

Recently, the Board accepted the recommendation of Roland de Jesus, Vice President for Philippine Operations, that we increase the Contribution to Living Expenses for our scholars in accordance with Philippine government data about increases in the cost of living. The cost of living is calculated for 17 regions and since 2005, the last time we made an adjustment, the increase ranged from 13% in the Cagayan Valley to a high of 36% in Davao. This increase will have a large impact on PCAFPD's budget in coming years.

You can help in several ways. First, consider increasing your regular contribution—even a \$5 or \$10 addition to your check would help. Second, consider sponsoring a scholar (perhaps with your group-mates or co-workers) for \$1,000 a year. Third, send us the address of any Philippines RPCV you know, so we can add them to our mailing list if they are not already on it. We have contact information for about 1,600 of the estimated 8,500

PCVs who served in the Philippines. Finding new RPCVs for the mail list will also enable us to keep them informed about 50th Anniversary activities in 2011. Finally; if you are on the newsletter mail list and do not usually contribute, please consider sending a gift this year.

Direct individual contributions (sent directly to PCAFPD) account for over four-fifths of all revenues. Last year we received more than 400 individual contributions (individuals may have contributed more than once).

As it should be, our largest expense is direct aid to our scholars in the form of tuition, fees, books, uniforms, supplies and living allowances. Last year scholar support accounted for 83 percent of our expenses or \$32,255. This was an increase of about \$3,500 from the previous calendar year, attributable to an increase in the number of scholars as well as an increase in tuition, fees, and other scholar related costs. The newsletter – which, in addition to seeking donations, meets the third goal of the Foundation to "inform the American public about Philippine persons, matters, and issues, including the work of the Foundation in the Philippines" – accounted for almost 9 percent of all expenses. Administrative expenses in the United States and the Philippines each ran about 4 percent. Our administrative expenses are minimal because of our

all-volunteer board here and in the Philippines, and, most important, the untold volunteer hours put in by Roland de Jesus, assisted by Daisy Mejia and Martha Lucero.

If we don't have an increase in income beyond what we saw in 2009, we project a larger deficit for 2010.

Bottom line, for an organization of our size, we do a lot of good with the funds we raise. The essays of our scholars elsewhere in this issue are testimony to the value of the investment you make in our work. If we don't have an increase in income beyond what we saw in 2009, we project a larger deficit for 2010. While a deficit can be absorbed for one year without taking too big a bite out of reserves, we cannot sustain long-term shortfalls.

We need your increased financial support and your help to find more RPCVs who served in the Philippines. Please help us make 2010 a great year!

She also gave us some ideas and hints on how and where to extend services with some NGOs in the city. The event was fun and worth-remembering.

One active member also is Sancho, who is a full-time volunteer at Little Children of the Philippines and at the same time is a busy student in Business Administration at Foundation University. Jody Iren is active in her Red Cross organization. She was also a Dean's Awardee this past school year. Hopefully, she could be another history-maker in the academic life of PCAFPD scholars.

The activities we had last year were not incomegenerating. This year we focused on how to raise funds for us to pursue our planned activities. Last February 14 we sold flower bouquets and hearts on sticks. We bought the flowers and made bouquets. Making the bouquets was not so easy, but we were able to finish them late at night and sell them starting in the early morning on Valentine's Day. We brought our pail of flowers and stood in front of churches, malls, parks and by the boulevard. It was really fun because it was our

first time to roam around the city and sell flowers on that special day. Our items were sold out by 7 in the evening. It was a tough kind of fund-raising job, yet we were happy and bonded through our efforts and the purpose of raising the money for our failed feeding project last year as we didn't have the funds. We earned a little but that was a blessing as we were able to open a bank account with our very first fund-raising project for PSAA Negros. Another fund-raising we agreed to is monthly dues of 30 pesos wherein each member will save 1 peso a day. We started this last month. The small amount we have now in our account could only support our project to be implemented this month. Thus, we will focus also on services that would not involve money like connecting to other non-profit organizations. As part of the plan, we will have our reunion next month and tree-planting activity before the rainy seasons.

My deepest thanks go to the PSAA Negros members who are faithful in fulfilling their tasks. The commitment of each member made us bonded to face the challenges together in the pursuit of peace and development of our beloved country. Thanks to PCAFPD supporters and volunteers for the infinite support and service to young Filipinos. Most of all, we gives thanks to the Almighty for the guidance he bestowed to us.

To maintain their scholarships, scholars need to earn passing grades, report on their activities each semester and comply with other terms of the scholarship such as gaining prior approval to change schools or majors.

PCAFPD is happy to welcome these outstanding young people to the program.

Keep up with plans for Peace Corps' 50th anniversary

March 1, 2011 will mark the 50th anniversary of the signing of an Executive Order by President John F. Kennedy to establish the Peace Corps. The subsequent legislation passed in September 1961. The first "botch" of Philippines Volunteers arrived in the Philippines on Oct. 12, 1961.

Celebrations of the anniversary will occur throughout the year in Peace Corps countries and in communities across the U.S., culminating in a large gathering in Washington, D.C., in September 2011. The first event will take place in Ann Arbor, Mich., this October to observe the first time that Kennedy put forth the concept of a Peace Corps in a speech at the University of Michigan during his campaign for the presidency.

Unfortunately, at the time of publication of this newsletter, specific plans with event descriptions, dates and times are not yet available, and we only publish two newsletters a year. There is no question but that PCAFPD will be involved in planning Philippines-specific celebrations in collaboration with Peace Corps headquarters, Peace Corps Philippines and the National Peace Corps Association. Since plans are likely to emerge before the next newsletter at the end of the year, we want to direct you to several sources of information that you may want to consult occasionally to keep abreast of developments.

Full circle: Tracing her Philippine roots and grandparents' legacy

When I talk to other minority RPCVs, they often say that their first challenge in considering Peace Corps is to explain to their parents what the Peace Corps is.

This wasn't the case for me – my parents already knew the Peace Corps because PCVs had been serving in our home province of Bohol since the 1960s. My parents immigrated to the U.S. in 1972, when I was two years old, and growing up in California I knew of Peace Corps both as an institution and as a part of my family's history.

I served as an English teacher in Cameroon in

1993-1995. In 1996, my parents and I returned to the Philippines upon my grandmother's death.

Aurelia Aranas, Sylvia Cabus' grandmother, helped PCVs in Bohol in 1965-68.

While looking through her papers, my mother and I found the addresses of two of the PCVs that my grandmother, a school

teacher, had worked with.

I wrote to Charles Kaza (Bohol 1965-67) and David Flaccus (Bohol and Cebu 1966-1968) and mentioned that she had passed away and that I myself had served as a PCV. They responded with reminiscences about my grandparents, and sent photocopies of their journals and letters describing my grandparents as vigorous and active community members.

They shared stories of friendship with my grandparents, Francisco and Aurelia Aranas, including how my grandparents patiently humored the volunteers in Tubigon.



here with neighborhood kids. She was an English teacher (TEFL).

My own motivation and interest in Peace Corps partly stemmed from Peace Corps' long presence in the Philippines. I'm proud to continue that tradition and to know that my grandparents inspired others as well.

Sylvia Cabus was a PCV in Cameroon, 1993-95. She lives in Washington, D.C., and works as an analyst at an international development consulting firm. She often attends PCAFPD meetings.
