### Explore

#### Online Research

QuestionPro defined **online research** as a method that involves the collection of information from the internet. Whether it may be a personal or a professional purpose, it has a great impact on building one's knowledge.

It is essential to be familiar with researching information online since it is considered to be one of the most important skills a person can possess in today's generation. Search engines were invented to help with researching online. According to Computer Hope, it is a software that searches a database of information according to the user's query which then provides a list of results that best match what the user is trying to find. There are different search engines such as Google, Yahoo, and Bing that give different search results.

### Advantages of Online Research

- Researchers have easier access to large information whether they are at school or home through devices such as smartphones.
- Researchers acquire diverse information in different formats, such as videos and audio recordings, that may not be present in a library's collection.
- Researchers save more time in researching online than doing the traditional way.
- Researchers get up-to-date and relevant information since internet sources are updated more frequently than print sources.
- Researchers can reduce the cost of conducting research.

### Disadvantages of Online Research:

- Researchers may encounter inconsistent information since it can be easily edited.
- Researchers may be challenged in determining whether the source is reliable.
- Researchers may be charged with payments to have access to some sources, such as some online journals.
- Researchers may find difficulty in locating information since some may require exact details to search.
- Researchers may risk their security and privacy online.

### Five Simple Search Process

Even though the internet can be useful in researching, it can sometimes be confusing. In a blog of Kathleen Moris, she pointed out 5 research skills that helps with common challenges faced by researchers such as what search terms to put into search engines, which search results to click on, how to determine what information is credible, how to process, synthesize, evaluate, and present the information and how to cite sources correctly.

### Clarify

For a research process to be more effective and efficient, it is essential to define the task first. Take time to think about what information you are actually looking for in your research. Knowing what you want and do not want is very helpful in getting your aim results and avoiding unnecessary results. This would save time in the whole procedure.

### Search

The quality of the search terms you put in the search engines will determine the quality of results. Using unique and specific search terms can make a difference. Practicing suitable use of keywords, phrases and questions will help since some sources require exact words or correct details to show desired information. Proper spelling and punctuation marks may also affect the search results. Below are more tips and tricks from [system-overload.org](http://system-overload.org) that can help improve your internet search which applies to the most commonly used search engines.

- If you are searching for an exact phrase or sequence of words, enclosed it with a double quotation mark ( " ).
- If you are looking for a product in a specific price range, use ( .. ) in between your desired price range.
- If you want to exclude a word or even a page from your result list, put a minus sign ( - ) directly in front of the keyword which you do not want to search for.
- If you want to search within a certain website only, use the ( site: ).
- If you want search results to contain similar words, use the tilde ( ~ ).
- If you are searching with words using 'or', it should be capitalized. Using parentheses ( ) can also help with the logical OR.
- If you are searching not so popular informations, use the asterisk sign ( \* ) as a wildcard.
- If you want to search for documents with specific file type, include .pdf (Adobe), .doc (Word), .xls (Excel), .ppt (PowerPoint) and .jpg (Image).
- If you want to search for a definition, add the word '**define**' before the word.

- If you want to search other related results, check the list of 'Related Searches' or search suggestions displayed at the bottom of the page.

### Delve

As important as entering quality search terms, knowing what search results to click on is also an important process. Try to look beyond the first few results. The sequence of the search results does not necessarily mean the information is in order from the most useful to not.

Inspecting the URL, specifically the domain and its extension is essential to check whether the sources are reliable. Domains that include **.gov** or **.edu** are considered to be more reliable sources.

### Evaluate

Since search engines do not base its order of results to credibility, you should always double check information. Remember that you cannot believe everything you read online. It is always better to check multiple sources to compare and contrast the information you have just read. It is a good way to examine whether the information you have read is accurate.



#### Tips

To search for specific information you are after, you can look for the search box on a webpage or use Control F (Command F on Mac) to bring up a search box that can scan throughout the webpage.

### Cite

Being well informed about plagiarism and copyright infringement is one thing you should not forget when acquiring information you need. Although there is easy access to numerous sources online, it does not mean you will ignore the legal terms on them. It is best to know the specific terms that are applied to that specific information before assuming you can reuse them. When you have difficulty in finding these terms, try to check the original source of information.

While paraphrasing and summarizing is a good approach that would avoid plagiarism, a proper citation is still the best way to use information legally. There are different styles of citations you can use for different manner of writing. You can check those out on the link below.

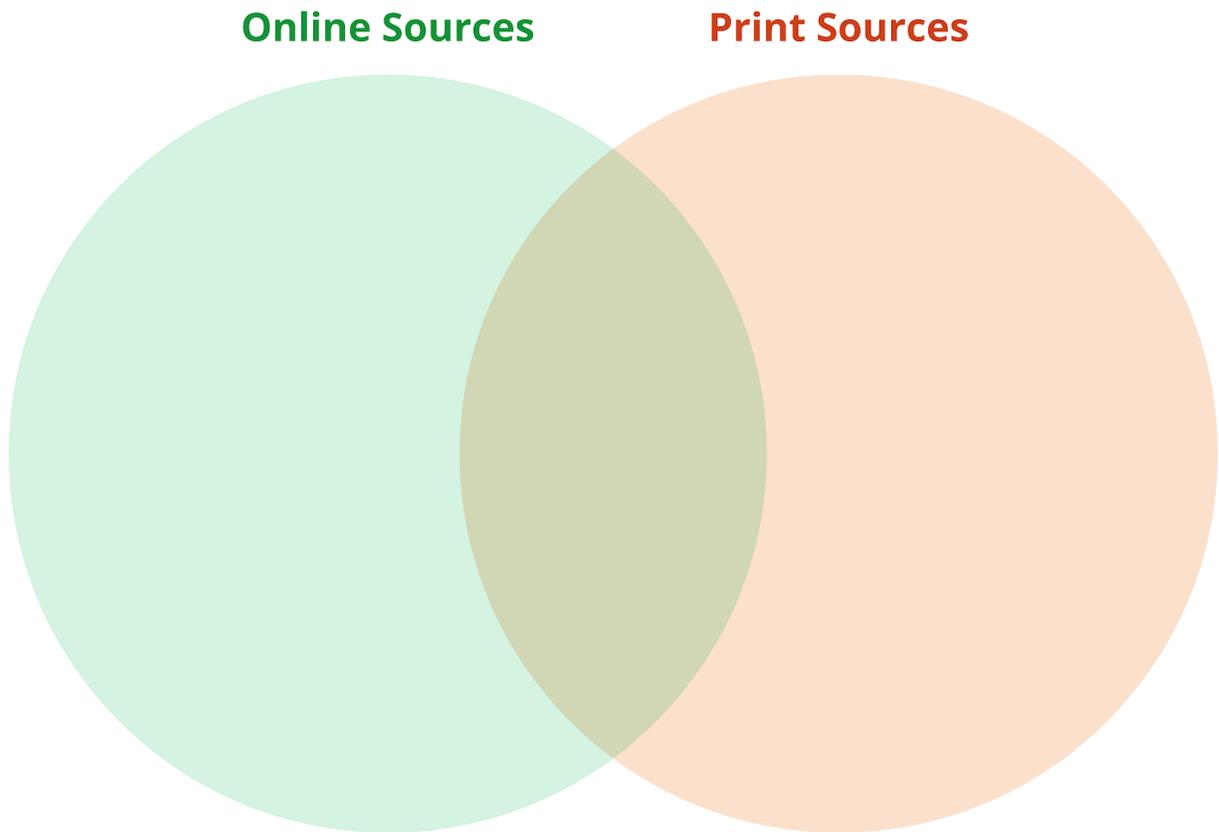
