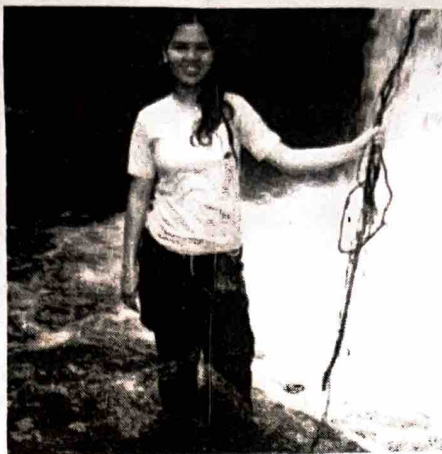
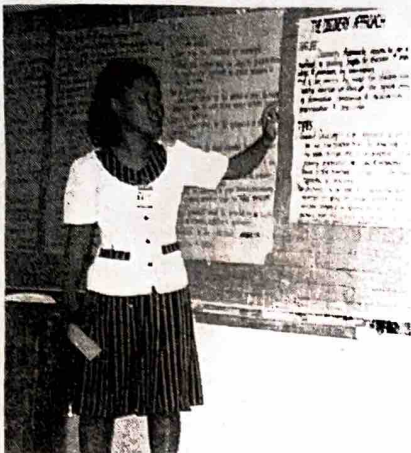

Saturday, most of the teenagers, organized by **PJ Stevens**, went to Universal Studios. Most of the adults did their own thing. Staff prepared for the evening festivities. In the evening, we had "Dress Rehearsal Night." RPCVs and former staff performed the *Pandango sa Ilaw* dance, *Tinikling*, singing and stand up comedy. **Cecile Motus**, our guest speaker, delivered a very uplifting address. She was filled with pride as she recognized the presence of the second generation RPCVs. She brought back many memories and also encouraged us to carry on the Peace Corps Spirit. And then we danced the night away. The teenagers as well as the young ones enjoyed the night as well. Everyone was part of the program.

The last day of the event was a poolside party and a recap of our experiences through slide showing presented by **Dave Hogan** with **Jack Williford**. There we have seen the cultural changes that represented each decade from fashion to hairstyle.

Before we parted, a common interest of seeing old friends, meeting new ones and creating the Peace Corp bond was born. Everyone decided to have this reunion every two years in Washington, DC/Virginia, Boston, Madison (Wisconsin), or Las Vegas. We will decide and send information by summer 2001. Group 3 Retreats to California

Before we heard about celebrations of Peace Corps' 40th anniversary, **Sunshine (Gene) Gibbs** and I were talking about organizing a reunion for Philippines Group 3. I checked on the Internet to locate volunteers who had been in training in Puerto Rico and Penn State, and had gone to the Philippines in 1962. We found most of them. Through a year of planning, we formed a network of communication that created a reunion before we even met. One pair of ex-PCVs found out that one now works within 2 miles of where the other lives in New Hampshire.

Over the weekend of Feb. 16-19, we gathered at three condominiums on the beach south of Santa Cruz, CA. Of 41 who went to *Samar* and *Leyte* in 1962, 23 of us met, joined by 7 spouses/partners. We each had "15 Minutes of Fame" to tell what had happened in our lives since Peace Corps. This time to be heard by sympathetic ears created an intensity of sharing that drew all the group in. It was a time for rejoicing in successes without competition, for listening to struggles and hard times without judgment, for sharing the ideals that shaped our lives.

We heard from others who were not able to attend: **Edith Barksdale Sloan, ML Corwin, Gary James, Fred Knoth, Ivan Propst, and Don Smith. Bill Finister and Bob Zimmerman** were reached after the reunion.

It was amazing how many of the group remained in education or some form of communication. For many, the Peace Corps years had deeply influenced what they subsequently did. For all, that time had been extremely important, and remained alive with vivid memories. So we had our own 40th anniversary celebration. Our group first met on Dec. 26, 1961. Many of us had not seen each other since termination, now we have reunited, and the reunion continues!

RPCVs Recall Rewards of Service in the Philippines

In the last newsletter, we asked RPCV readers what their experience in the Peace Corps had meant to them. The following RPCVs sent us these reflections.

I joined the Peace Corps in 1964 after I graduated from Stanford University. John F. Kennedy's words were inspirational: "Ask not what your country can do for you but what you can do for your country." (It still sounds like good advice.) It seemed as though a college graduate with an English degree could make a contribution to the world community. I went to the Philippines, to the island of Cebu, to teach English as a Second Language. Looking back, I realize I was a student as well as a teacher for those two years.

I think my experiences as a Peace Corps Volunteer helped form my approach to art. Living in a tiny town far removed from city and suburbs made a big impression on me. I was closer to the natural world in Cebu than I had ever been in California.

As the plane took me away from Surigao del Norte in 1981, I sat near a window looking down on the island and suddenly I saw "my" village, Anao-Aon, where I spent two of the happiest and most emotional years of my life. I felt I was deserting my friends.

I started crying bitterly thinking of all the people I left behind,

The town of Moalboal on the Western Coast of Cebu sometimes looked like a paradise, at least from certain camera angles. But people were always a part of this landscape. Ugliness and death coexisted with great natural beauty. The diseases of children and adults, the inadequate education and precarious incomes of the poorest people made me start to understand that beauty and sadness were both part of life.

Living in the countryside, I learned that the tropical landscape was alive with stories about spirits who may have inhabited certain groves of trees and other favorable spots. The whole area came to life through recollections and beliefs of the Filipino people I knew.

I was amazed to realize how a person could live off the land. I hadn't observed this in the California suburbs. In Cebu, at that time, a hungry person could find foods such as bananas and coconuts. During the Japanese occupation many families I knew had lived in the hills of Cebu fleeing the Japanese. I understood that there was a natural abundance in the tropics.

Fundamentally, my Peace Corps experience was about people. It was also about hope.



people who had given me their love and trust and taught me that I don't need things to be happy in life.

They helped me to understand their way of life and I helped them to understand America. I tried so hard to teach nutrition and health but most of all we became friends.

Till now they are in my prayers and till now some write to me. Sixteen years later I went back to visit and they were so happy and I was happier still and all of us cried and laughed.

Invisible threads bind me to the Philippines, threads of love no one can break. People in Anao-Aon, I will never forget you!

Though my Peace Corps experience in the Philippines ended 33 years ago, it is still the defining period of my life. Through the vision of President Kennedy and the support of the American taxpayer, I was given the opportunity to take part in a sharing of cultures that cannot be duplicated.

I was always curious before Peace Corps how much commonality we

shared as human beings and how much our cultures caused us to differ.

After learning to speak Ilongo, eat kanun, ginamus, balot, sap-sap, danugaon, and other staples, I felt that I got past the trappings of culture and shared the hopes, pain, joys, and frustrations of my Filipino friends and co-workers. I was able to confirm my belief we as humans share so much more than we suspect.

For the past 33 years, I have been a public school teacher in a school that has much diversity. My Peace Corps experience has been invaluable in my work. I thank everyone who made it possible.

Peace Corps/Philippines Historic Round-Up

More Volunteers have been sent to the Philippines than to any of the 134 other countries where the Peace Corps has served; Ecuador is second with 5,633 PCVs. Historic Agency records indicate that as many as 8,974 PCVs may have gone to the Philippines since 1961. However, the computerized records contain only the following information:

Blasts from the Past

Ray McEachern (1961-63) has posted historic, funny, photos of Group 1 on the Internet: www.a-rm.org/philpics/pcpi.htm

January 1961, from **John F. Kennedy's** inaugural address:

...To those people in the huts and villages of half the globe struggling to break the bonds of mass misery, we pledge our best efforts to help them help themselves, for whatever period is required—not because the Communists may be doing it, not because we seek their votes, but because it is right...

September 1961, from first Peace Corps/Philippines Director, **Lawrence H. (Larry) Fuchs**, to Group 1 in training:

...Transportation from Manila to any of the major points of concentration is fast, reliable, and relatively inexpensive.

...We are all humbled by the amount there is to learn from the Filipinos. They can teach us a great deal, not only about their own culture, history, language and politics, but about their ways of doing things. Some Americans become easily frustrated by their different style of life but there is undoubtedly considerable wisdom in it. So we have realized that we have even more to learn than to teach...

November 18, 1961, from Quijano de Manila, *Phillipine Free Press*:

...Besides training for seven weeks at Penn State, the volunteers undergo seven more weeks of training at Los Banos...

The effect of all these young pilgrim Americans on that particular campus may be indicated by what two Peace Corps girls are currently doing: helping aggie students put on a Sartre play, *No Exit*, which is about a man trapped in hell with a prostitute and a lesbian.

When these young Americans move to the barrios, their effect should be even more exciting.

October 1962, from *Ang Boluntario*, the PCV newsletter:

Ode to Compost by PCV **Jerry Poznak**

Haste thee, Jack, and bring with thee
Compost sweet for all to see –
Peat and mold and lime composed,
A draught of moss gently hosed.

Stack it, sift it, place on leaves,
Turn it, toss it, bless the sheaves.
Toast it, roast it as it lies,
Give it air and shoo the flies.

Hold it, smell it, spread it thin,
Knead it, sift it, throw things in –
A bit of sunlight on the vine,
Mulberry bush or eglantine.

Once you've done it to a turn,
Invite the townsfolk in to learn
Of glories that this stuff will do,
If only they will love it too...
