Philippine Ambassador to Host Reception for Peace Corps' 40th Anniversary Celebration

This year's National Peace Corps Association's 2002 Conference, "The Peace Corps Family: Bringing the World Together", is rescheduled for June 20-23, 2002, at the OMNI Shoreham Hotel in Washington, DC. The Philippine Ambassador to the United States, his Excellency Albert del Rosario, will host a Reception on Friday, June 21 from 6:30 to 8:30 pm, at the Philippine Embassy, 1600 Massachusetts Avenue, NW. The Country Update for the Philippines will be held on Saturday afternoon from 3 to 5 pm, at a location to be announced. Both of these events have been organized by PCAFPD.

All day conference events on Thursday, June 20, include Advocacy Day on the Hill and "The Global Challenge", which brings together 60 Towson University Kids of Peace elementary-aged campers with Returned Peace Corps Volunteers to participate in hands-on activities based on Peace Corps Assignments. On Friday, the Opening Ceremony kicks off at 9:00 am with keynote speaker Alejandro Toledo, President of Peru, followed by award ceremonies, workshops and panels. All day Bazaars, Career Fairs and workshops will take place over the weekend. The conference will conclude on Sunday with a Closing Ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery, following the early morning procession to Arlington across Memorial Bridge.

Loving Teaching

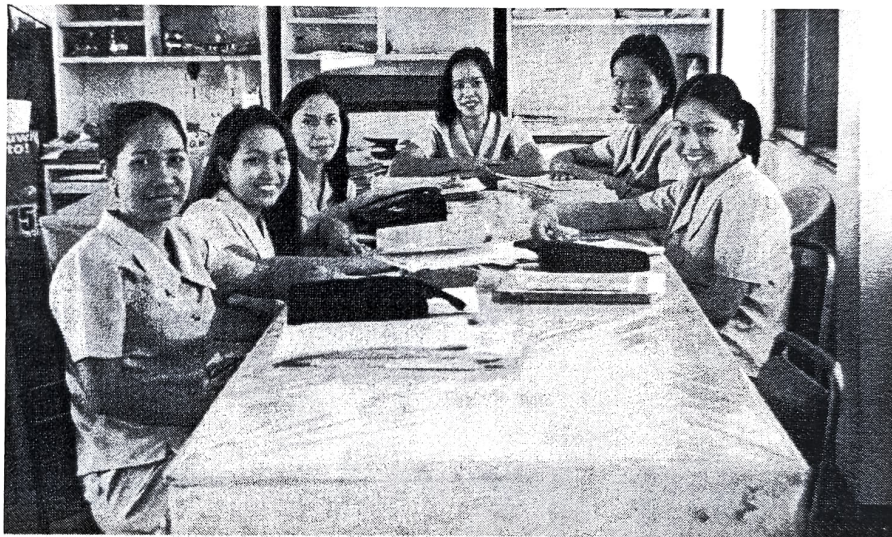

2 cups sticky rice
1 cup brown sugar
¾ can coconut milk

Cook the rice in 4 cups water. Turn it over once during cooking. Meanwhile mix the brown sugar and coconut milk in a pan over medium heat for about ten minutes until it thickens slightly. After the rice is cooked combine the rice and the sauce. Leave a little sauce in the pan and caramelize it to spread on the top. I sometimes add ½ cup flaked coconut to the sauce for a little different texture.

Pat Kasdan, Long-Time PCAFPD Newsletter Editor, Hands Over the Reins to New Members

Pat Kasdan produced the PCAFPD Newsletter for twelve years. A member of Group II, Pat arrived in the Philippines just a couple of months after Group I and served from 1961 to 1963 as a teacher in the small fishing village of Banate in Iloilo. Among her many distinctions as a Volunteer, she had the honor of becoming the barrio fiesta queen of Dumagas, Iloilo, where she worked during her summer breaks. Pat joined the PCAFPD in 1990 and worked with Chad Walter on the newsletter. When Chad left in 1993, Pat went solo. Twenty-three issues later, the newsletter is stronger and more widely distributed than ever, and remains the most important means for communicating with our contributors, former Peace Corps volunteers and staff from the Philippines, current volunteers, and our scholars. Pat served PCAFPD in many ways beyond her role as newsletter editor. She also served as Vice President of the Board for 4 years and regardless of the major challenge or menial task that faced the Board, Pat was always "the one" to carry more than her share of responsibility.

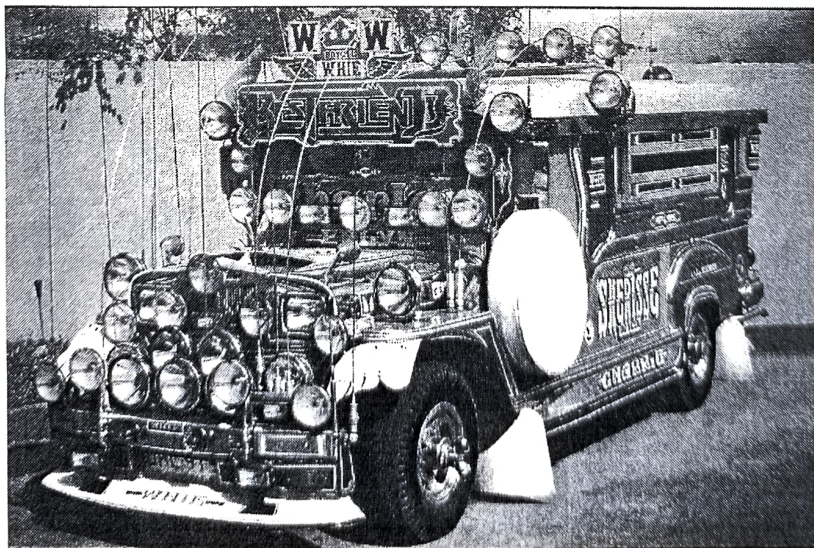
As a social scientist, Pat's career included five years with Peace Corps Headquarters in Washington, DC, where she conducted surveys of returned volunteers, resulting in some of the first information on the life paths of RPCVs.

Her most memorable moment as a PCAFPD Board Member? When the PCAFPD organized a fundraising trip to the Philippines in 1996 in honor of the 35th Anniversary of the Peace Corps, and she met many of our scholars and President Fidel Ramos. She also visited her old site, and got to test ride a few of the more modern jeepneys (see picture below).

Despite the dramatic economic development and changes there, her friends and colleagues remembered her well and honored her with much fanfare, including a rendition of her favorite song at the time, "Moon River". Our deep appreciation to Pat for her years of service both here and in the Philippines to strengthen the cause of education and Philippine development.

Pat remains a close "Friend of the Board" and we hope to see her often at meetings and events.

The new editor, Erica Ruhl, is a more recently returned volunteer, serving in Tanauan, Leyte, as a Water Sanitation Volunteer from April 1999 to August 2000. She currently works for an environmental consulting firm. Lyn Morland (Philippines 1982-1984), who currently works as an anthropologist, assisted Erica with this issue.

Searching for Information on a Former Peace Corps Philippines Volunteer

Does anyone remember Laura Emma Brodbeck? I am in search individuals who may have served with Laura Emma Brodbeck (1892-1988) who was the oldest member of the Peace Corps when she entered at age 69 in 1961. Sworn in by Director R. Sargent Shriver, she trained in Hilo, Hawaiian November (probably 1961) for her two year tour in the Philippines. One of 62 volunteers, Emma Brodbeck was the only American to serve in the town of Lazion the island of Siquijor during her two years in the Peace Corps. Emma was assigned to work with the elementary school teachers and students.

Laura Emma Brodbeck is a relative of mine and I am doing research on her life. A 1914 graduate of the University of Chicago with a BS degree in science, Phi Beta Kappa, her adventurous life included 35 years as a missionary in far West China beginning in 1918, the first American woman to travel the Burma Road in 1941 while the Japanese were invading East China, 10 days in prison by the Communists at the end of her missionary experience in China, director of Filamer Christian Institute (now Filamer Christian College) in Roxas City, the Philippines, and in 1961 was the oldest member of the Peace Corps at that time. I would appreciate hearing from anyone who may have met Emma during her time in the Peace Corps. Thanks.
